Ways to use it for...

Searching

Can give more detailed answers than Google.

Good for definitions and translations.

Can recommend further reading or make book suggestions

Can give a summary of an article, text or theory.

Returns searches in accessible format

Can suggest the best searches to get the results you want.

Learn something new. Ask it to teach you a new skill or topic.

Explain the ontological argument.

Translate the following into French...

Summarize chapter four of...

What happens in act one of...

What are the major themes in...

"What keywords and phrases can I use to find information on..."

Evaluating

Use ChatGPT to evaluate your work and suggest improvements.

Ask it to...



Give advice: "How should I...?"



Suggest methods to test a scientific hypothesis



Check your work for bias.



Create study aids and flash cards.



Give different perspectives on a subject.



Generate a quiz or test to evaluate your knowledge.



Anticipate problems: what might go wrong if...?



Generate a marking scheme to assess your work.



Summarise your work

ChatGPT can be a useful aid for students that uses existing text taken from the internet, blogs, open access publishing, websites, study essay banks, research texts and much more. It uses probability to complete your request, but it cannot think critically like a human.

Always check it to make sure it makes sense and rephrase it to make your work original!

Organising



Create a study routine or timetable to prioritise tasks.



Study aid. Copy in your notes and ask to group into topics, highlight keywords or prioritise information.



Make a step-by-step work plan or ask it to finish your plan.
